Here we come again with a log of the rest of the fellows, and quotes from a few of the letters we have received from you.

We have no dope on the whereabouts of the following, and if any of their addresses are known, please send them to us.

Letters have been received from some of you, for which we thank you. In the last two days I have received letters from England, Italy, Yugo Slavia, India, the Phillipines and the Pacific, and will acknowledge them after I complete the Log of the men.

Lt. (j.g.) Dave Gallaher (the nephew) is now home on a short leave, due to the serious illness of his father. Dave is stationed at Mare Island Fire School, and says he has seen more fires in six months at the Fire School than he believed he would ever see. Dave enlisted as an Electrician's Mate, and after service in the South West Pacific, where he was in on several Landings, made a Commission, and since indoctrination, has been at Mare Island, but expects to be shipped out soon.

Lt. Dale Gallaher (Uncle) is now stationed at Norfolk, Virginia.

Lt. Henry Burns was in the Fourth Marine Division at Iwo Jima, and ran into some tough luck on the seventh day. From his father we learn that he is in a Navy Hospital, in the Central Pacific, and is coming along O.K.

Bob has to go back to school, as he has to teach some of our Junior Birdmen all the whys and wherefores of certain equipment. One of the Local Aviators was recently home on furlough. At a little party, where "Liquid Refreshments" were served, a Sergeant, who had made many missions as an Aerial Gunner was also present. Seems like the Officer and Sergeant had flown over a lot of the same territory, so the boys had a little secret session in the bath-room, and being behind locked doors, no Military secrets were revealed to the Civilians present. In fact very little of the Military Personnel was seen, but the boys talked the same language and had a good time. The party was a success (for them).

C. O. Farber, S 1/c (C.), writes from California, that after going to school at Seattle, he is aboard a Destroyer Escort, assigned to Fire Control on a 40 m.m. gun. He is leaving for the South Pacific soon. Sends best wishes to the gang at Eng. 7.

Pvt. "Tommy" Thompson writes from Germany that they have been working day and night since they moved up from Belgium. It is tougher, since they and the civilian population are "Not Speaking". Tommy is still an M.P. in the 3rd Replacement Depot.

Gunner, but they put him in three or four other classes. He likes it better than the other field, so far, but just wait until they start "Bearing Down."
